Advancing Cancer Care in Our Community

Together we are changing the course of this disease

In October of 2021, Lakeridge Health Foundation launched *Our Cancer Campaign* and our donor family has been growing ever since. Thanks to the kindness of our community, new and current donors have helped us achieve over 82 per cent of the campaign's ambitious \$20 million goal by the end of our fiscal year.

In 2022/23, we raised nearly \$3 million in support of research, education, capital projects and equipment to advance cancer care across our Oshawa hospital, our region and beyond. Because of the generosity of donors like you, we are funding items that play vital roles in each step of a patient's cancer journey.

This includes new state-of-the-art staining equipment in the laboratory that helps rapidly diagnose cancerous tissue, critical capital costs required to bring a new linear accelerator to the R.S. McLaughlin Durham Regional Cancer Centre radiation therapy department and for the first time ever, surgical robotics.

Lakeridge Health Announces Revolutionary Surgical Innovation

In September, Lakeridge Health made an exciting announcement: robotic surgery was coming to Durham Region. This innovation would transform the way our surgeons care for gynecology, thoracic, urology and colorectal cancer patients. Surgical robotics drastically improves patient experience, decreases readmission rates, increases cost savings for our health care system and attracts talented surgeons to Lakeridge Health.

Robotic surgery is a thrilling step forward for our Hospital's surgical department and is the single most important surgical innovation at Lakeridge Health in the last decade. The da Vinci Surgical System offers our expert surgeons unparalleled control, real-time high-definition 3D imaging, and four arms with 360-degree ranges of motion. Patients will also experience safer surgeries, less blood loss, faster recovery periods and shorter stays in our Hospital. The equipment does not replace any team members on the team, but rather enhances their skills and abilities.

Lakeridge Health Foundation committed to \$5.1 million as part of *Our Cancer Campaign* to bring the equipment to our Oshawa Hospital and implement the program.

A Million Thanks to the Verwey Family!

Bob and Sue Verwey know the impact that a cancer diagnosis can have. Loved ones, friends and team members at their various businesses have all used the services at their local Cancer Centre. Their family wanted to step up in a big way to help change the course of this disease – and so they did!

Through the Bob and Sue Verwey Family Foundation, they pledged to match all donations to surgical robotics, up to one million dollars.

An outpouring of support was inspired by the Verweys and in a few short months the match was met. In December, the da Vinci robot arrived and training commenced between then and March 2023. The first robotic procedures were performed by Dr. Julie-Ann Francis and Dr. Elena Igwe, gynecologic oncologists, the first week of April.

Thanks to you and an infusion of support from the Verweys, the arrival of the da Vinci Surgical System was expedited and is already making an incredible impact on cancer care in this community.

One man’s journey as the first patient to have two robotic surgeries

When Joe found out he had cancer, the news was difficult to hear. He was diagnosed with Lyme Disease in 2022 and was struggling with some respiratory issues. Joe’s team was investigating his symptoms when they discovered two tumours: one on his abdomen and one on his lung.

A series of tests ensued and Joe found out the tumour on his lung was so close to his aorta that a biopsy wasn’t possible. Thanks to donor support, Joe’s surgeon, Dr. Daniel Sisson, had options.

“Dr. Sisson told us about a new robotic surgical system at the Hospital that would help him safely diagnose and remove my tumour,” recalls Joe. “He asked if we’d be open to it. We had no questions – we said yes, of course!”

On April 18, Joe was one of the first thoracic patients to undergo robotic surgery with the goal of addressing his lung tumour first.

Using the da Vinci Robotic Surgical System, the team delicately removed a piece of tissue from his tumour and sent it to the lab for immediate diagnosis. The expert pathology team at the Oshawa Hospital used staining equipment to make a high-level diagnosis of the type and severity of Joe’s tumour.

Within 20 minutes a pathologist reported back to the surgical team. With results in hand, the robot was used to remove only a small portion of Joe’s lung along with the tumour. Joe spent one night in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) and was home 24 hours after his surgery. Miraculously back to his favourite hobby – hiking by the lake – within two weeks.

Cancer is complex, however, and over the course of a few weeks Joe’s care team studied his case and the biopsy of his tumour, determining Joe’s cancer was more severe than expected.



“Dr. Sisson told me my case was more complicated than he thought and additional tests had him concerned. I was told I needed to go back into surgery – right away – and I would need to have the lower lobe of my left lung removed.”

A few weeks after his first surgery, Joe and his family returned to the hospital. The surgery, led by Dr. Sisson and supported by fellow thoracic surgeon Dr. Shannon Trainor, took five hours. Joe was warned that while they would begin his procedure using the robot, it was possible the team would have to forgo the new innovation and open his chest, resulting in significant surgery and a lengthy recovery.

“The da Vinci Robot makes it feel like I’ve been shrunk down inside the body,” explains Dr. Sisson. “Laparoscopic, or the minimally invasive surgery most people have heard of, can feel like you are operating with two long sticks. There isn’t a lot of flexibility. With the robot, I can address complicated areas in ways I couldn’t before and the 3D high-definition camera gives me the best view possible.”

Dr. Sisson and his skilled team were miraculously able to perform Joe’s entire lobectomy using robotic methods. A scenario that stunned his colleagues.

“Joe’s surgery was one of the most remarkable things I have ever been a part of,” shared Dr. Shannon Trainor. “This equipment is going to do incredible things for our patients.”

After just two nights in the ICU, Joe was back with his family at home in Whitby. “My recovery is on the same track as before. I am feeling great and I can even go spend the weekend at the cottage. I see the oncologist in a few days to talk about my next step in the journey and the start of my chemotherapy. I’m anxious but I know we are in the right place.”

Joe’s cancer journey will have many working parts. From diagnostic imaging to surgery to treatment at the R.S. McLaughlin Durham Regional Cancer Centre, he’ll have the support of several expert teams and the innovative equipment at their fingertips, all at his community Hospital.

Monthly Donor Profile:

Hira and Family

Three and half years after Hira Ahmed-Tahir was first diagnosed with breast cancer at the age of thirty-six, she and her family are showing their gratitude for Lakeridge Health as monthly donors.

It all started when Hira had an unbearable itch, swelling and redness around her right breast area and immediately her husband advised her to go to the doctor.

The cause for concern was real, and after a series of tests Hira was diagnosed with breast cancer. She began chemotherapy in February of 2020 and completed 16 rounds at the R.S. McLaughlin Durham Regional Cancer Centre.

Hira also had genetic testing at Lakeridge Health Oshawa that revealed she was susceptible to two rare genetic mutations. Provided with the knowledge that she could face another difficult treatment journey if the cancer appeared in her left breast, Hira made the decision to undergo a double mastectomy.

"All I could think about was that I had this cancer in me and I wanted it removed," recalls Hira. "After I had my bilateral mastectomy in July 2020, the pathology results revealed that five out of eleven of my lymph nodes were cancerous. We knew it was the right decision."

Hira was nervous about her chemotherapy because she knew her treatment would be aggressive.

"My oncology nurse put me at ease," Hira shares. "I remember the fear and the anxiety. However, my nurse was so calm and that helped me. My entire medical team were my superheroes. I knew they understood what I was going through and what I needed without me having to say much."

Hira's family and friends were an important part of her support system. "I have a supportive network including my husband Mubasher Tahir, my three daughters, my parents, my parents-in-law, my extended family and friends. I will be honest, it was a challenging time for all of us."

Hira finished her chemotherapy and radiation treatments as of September 2020, and has been on endocrine therapy ever since due to the severity of her cancer. She will continue with this treatment plan for up to eight years.

"We have this renowned Hospital and Cancer Centre just 15 minutes away from our house. It's a blessing to have that," says Hira, who explains that this is a main reason the Ahmed-Tahir Family have chosen to become monthly donors.

"I want to support what's close to my home. Lakeridge Health is where my family, my neighbours and my friends will visit when they require medical care. As we continue to donate, our Hospital will have the resources to help our entire community."

Queen's University and Lakeridge Health Collaborate to Address Physician Shortage

In 2022, Lakeridge Health launched a first-of-its-kind-in-Canada education and training approach that will help to address the ongoing physician shortage in many southeastern Ontario communities, including Durham Region.

Queen's University's School of Medicine has partnered with Lakeridge Health to create a satellite campus to train future physicians. The novel approach seamlessly integrates the training of medical students and residents, which are typically separate programs, to graduate practice-ready, community-focused physicians.

The Queen's-Lakeridge Health collaboration will begin offering 20 new medical school seats as early as 2023 at the Lakeridge Health satellite campus. Queen's University students will undergo classroom training at our Hospital and engage in workplace experiences embedded in communities across the region.

Emergency Department Launches Wait Times Tracker

In October, the Emergency Department Wait Times Tracker was launched to improve the Emergency Department (ED) experience. This online tool provides patients with an approximate wait time to see a physician in any one of the four Lakeridge Health EDs.

The web-based service is available at www.lh.ca. The data refreshes every 15 minutes and is based on an estimate that is calculated using the last four hours of data.

"Pinpointing the exact amount of time a person will wait to see a doctor in the ED is complex," explained Dr. Michael Howlett, Chief of Emergency Department, Lakeridge Health. "While the ED Wait Times Tracker provides an approximate wait time based on an estimate, providing this information to people will help to ease some of the distress, discomfort, and anxiety that is associated with coming into a hospital."

Lakeridge Health Receives National Award for Excellence in Surgical Care

In early 2023, the expert surgical team at Lakeridge Health was recognized by the American College of Surgeons National Surgical Quality Improvement Program (ACS NSQIP) as one of only 78 hospitals in North America to have achieved the "Meritorious" status for surgical patient care.

"We are very proud to be part of a select group of hospitals to receive this recognition," said Dr. John Dickie, Chief of Surgery. "This award acknowledges our unrelenting desire to ensure patients receive the highest quality of care and best experience."



Investing in Lakeridge Health's Incredible Staff

Lakeridge Health Foundation is committed to supporting the ongoing development of our medical professionals. In May 2022, during Nursing Week, 15 nurses pursuing a number of educational goals received support thanks to the Margaret Stainton Nursing Bursary.

Every summer, in partnership with the Academic Affairs program, we recognize Lakeridge Health researchers and educators with the Chiu awards named in honour of former Hospital staff and donors Deborah Chiu and her late husband, Dr. Hak Ming Chiu. Their awards acknowledge staff member contributions to the advancement of academics through both teaching and research.

In February 2023, the first-ever Allied Health Bursary was awarded to 10 allied health clinicians in roles such as physiotherapist, dietician, speech-language pathologist, and other specialized support staff. These team members are pursuing their goals thanks to new educational grants made possible by our kind donors.

Hak Ming Chiu Award for Strategic Contribution to Education

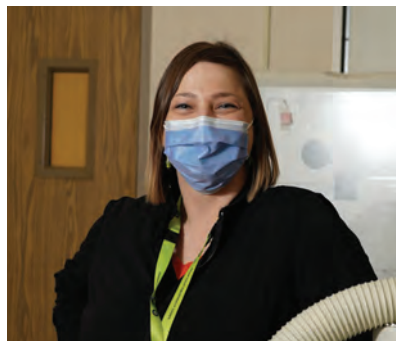

McLaughlin Durham Regional Cancer Centre. Similar to an urgent care clinic, the RROC provides timely access for cancer patients who are experiencing side effects from their care.

Endowment funds are held and invested by Lakeridge Health Foundation and income earned each year is applied toward patient care priorities, usually in consultation with the endowment fund donors or their family members.

Anne and Charles Morison have been friends and supporters of Lakeridge Health Foundation for decades and were very enthusiastic about establishing an endowment fund with our Foundation when the opportunity became available. When it came to spending the income from their fund last year, they wanted to focus on cancer services.

For Brooklyn Burger-Jacobs and her family, cancer care is a deeply personal topic. In December 2020, Brooklyn began her own fundraising campaign that would eventually raise over \$100,000 for an endowment fund built in honour of her late mother, Kelly, who passed away of pancreatic cancer in early 2021.

The Morisons and Brooklyn learned about the impact a phlebotomy (blood drawing) chair could have on the RROC and decided to combine the disbursements from their funds to purchase the chair together.



“Although bloodwork is a vital procedure in the diagnosis and treatment of cancer, it can be a very scary and uncomfortable experience,” says Brooklyn. “The blood drawing chair aims to relieve this anxiety by keeping patients as comfortable as possible while they are having their bloodwork done.”

Both patients and staff have benefitted from the new chair. Patients requiring bloodwork now have a comfortable seat that can adjust to meet their physical needs, and this specialized chair is also easier for patients to get in and out of.

The chair operates at a height that allows RROC team members to comfortably prepare patients for these procedures, alleviating pressure and strain on team members’ necks, legs and backs.

“I would like to give a huge thank you to the donors,” says Darrilyn Lessels, Patient Care Manager, Durham Regional Cancer Centre. “Thank you for seeing the value in investing in equipment that supports safe patient care in our Cancer Centre.”
